- Been in Dane County for 45 years
- Only Dane County organization focusing specifically on working with youth ages 17 – 24
- 78% of youth served are people of color
- Replicated in seven other communities in Wisconsin



In Wisconsin in 2015, 25% of Black students (4,819) as compared to 4.2% of White students (2,125) did not complete high school Source: Wisconsin DPI



State of Wisconsin Senior Survey Results 2015


What percent of Black youth leave high school without either a high school diploma or a plan?

- 35%
- 48%
- 66%
- 75%

The Paths Youth Take:

- Even as 30% of Blacks plan to attend a 4-year college, only 4% of UW System students are Black
- Within the Wisconsin Technical College System 4.6% of 2015 program graduates were Black

The Brain Development of the Older Youth



- Prefrontal Cortex is still growing and developing
- The levels of dopamine produces shifts during adolescence

Brain Development Impacts Youth Behaviors

Greater willingness to take risks

 More likely to seek pleasure through actions and consumption

 Lower ability to understand consequences and make long range plans

Wisconsin Policies in Youth Development

Over \$1 billion of State funds are invested in programming where older youth can make mistakes, gain skills and prepare for success in the workforce

State investment in youth-specific employment training not in college is under \$1 million annually

Why This Matters to Youth in My Neighborhood

- Lack of Opportunities in the Neighborhood
 - Limited employers
 - Limited training for life after high school
 - The decrease in basic needs and social support at age 18
 - Lack of affordable path to a driver's license

- Criminal Behavior and Recidivism
 - Tickets create roadblocks
 - Truancy
 - Minor drug offences
 - Illegal driving
 - How minor violations are handled is different
 - The recidivism rate for older youth is nearly 50%

But we will have Jobs Jobs Jobs

- Five out of the top thirty growth careers in the next ten years require at least a Bachelor's degree
- Ten require on-the-job training
- Five require an internship or apprenticeship
- Five require an Associate's degree

What can our community do?

- Young adult specific career training
- Restorative justice for older youth
- •Driver's license attainment
- Cross-cultural assistance
- •High School re-engagement efforts

Youth Specific Employment Training

- Youth learn differently
- Practical hands-on experience for tactile learners
- Wrap-around services for transition into adulthood (housing, food, transportation)
- Connection with employer and/or postsecondary
- Successful 78% of the time
- Local programs: YouthBuild, Corps Network, Jobs Corps, AmeriCorps

Restorative Justice for 18 – 24 Year Olds

- Dane County Community Court program began in 2015 with a focus on South Madison and Fitchburg areas
- 75% success rate in clearing cases
- Focus on nonviolent and non-drug related cases
- Expanding countywide in 2017

Cross Cultural Counseling

- Employer training
- Employability training
 - Interviewing
 - Attire
 - Workplace culture
 - Retention assistance

High School Re-engagement

Effective outreach by a third party

Alternative programming for completion

Case Management to overcome barriers

Continual caring support

Driver's License Attainment

- In Dane County, of jobs listed at the Job Center, a driver's license is the second most often listed requirement
- Truancy and ordinance infractions make it difficult to get a license
- Foray into the great White world:
 - 64% of White males and 74% of White females age 18–24 have a license
 - 22% of Black males and 34% of Black females have a license

What Else Can You Do?

- Ban the other box (the driver's license box)
- Provide an opportunity
- Mentor
- Engage in change -- flip the economic development mantra

Everyone needs a path to self-sufficiency

Building Futures

- Provide a path forward for twice as many youth
- Greater variety of industry specific
 training
- Youth Job Counseling for transition to the workplace
