

Help Lift Up Families of Color that Live in Poverty



Wisconsin's economic system has significant barriers to success for many communities of color, as a result of hundreds of years of inequitable policies.

36% of African American people live in poverty. 28% of Native American people live in poverty. 26% of Latinx people live in poverty. 19% of Asian American people live in poverty. 9% of White people live in poverty.



200,000 Wisconsin children live in poverty, and that we have severe racial and ethnic disparities in child poverty.



We urge candidates to:

- 1. Increase employment and income of low-income families.
- 2. Expand and improve support for low-income families.
- 3. Close the gender and racial pay gap.
- 4. Advocate for equitable tax policies.

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

Kids Forward's analysis of Wisconsin's Quality Rating and Improvement System (YoungStar) shows significant disparities in access to high quality (4 and 5 Star) programs for low-income African American kids.



We urge candidates to:

- 1. Eliminate disparities in access to high-quality programs for low-income families.
- 2. Support the childcare workforce, especially workers of color.
- Work to eliminate food deserts and invest in healthy, accessible outdoor space and age and culturally appropriate activities.
- 4. Promote and invest in trauma informed care.

IMMIGRATION

Immigrants come to the United States in search of a better life, to build a stronger future, and to achieve their dreams. Immigrants also bring significant contributions to Wisconsin's schools, communities, and economy—contributions that are enhanced when immigrants have full access to opportunity. Most immigrants in Wisconsin are people of color, so protecting immigrant families requires Wisconsin lawmakers to stand up for racial justice.



IMMIGRATION

We urge candidates to:

- 1. Keep families together.
- Make higher education affordable and accessible for undocumented youth.
- 3. Protect young immigrants vulnerable to deportation by supporting and strengthening DACA.
- 4. Remove barriers to driver licenses. Allow families to access help with health care, food, and housing without fear of retaliation.

- 2. Improve Wisconsin's Second Chance bill.
- 3. Give youth a voice.

WHAT'S AT STAKE.

Governor

The Governor of Wisconsin is the highest-ranking elected official in the state. They have the power to sign or veto laws passed by the legislature, they appoint people to serve in judicial and statewide positions, and they set the state's policy and budget priorities.

Lieutenant Governor

The Lieutenant Governor of Wisconsin is the first person in the order of succession behind the Governor. The Governor appoints them to various boards and commissions, and they work to advance the Governor's agenda.

US Senator

US Senators write and vote on our federal laws and policies. They also vote to confirm or deny Supreme Court nominations and some of the President's cabinet members.

Attorney General

The Attorney General of Wisconsin leads the state's Department of Justice and is the chief legal officer for the state. They provide legal advice and representation for all state agencies.

State Treasurer

The State Treasurer is the state's chief banker and has the ability to provide oversight on the financial transactions that involve tax dollars. They also serve as financial trustee to four trust funds and have the authority to determine the types of investments made by the funds.

Secretary of State

The Secretary of State of Wisconsin is an officer of the executive branch, and the second in the order of succession of the Governor of Wisconsin, behind the Lieutenant Governor. They play a role in preserving the integrity of our elections, and they keep records of all the official acts of the government.

Wisconsin voters will also be choosing who represents them in the **Wisconsin State Assembly and State Senate**.
